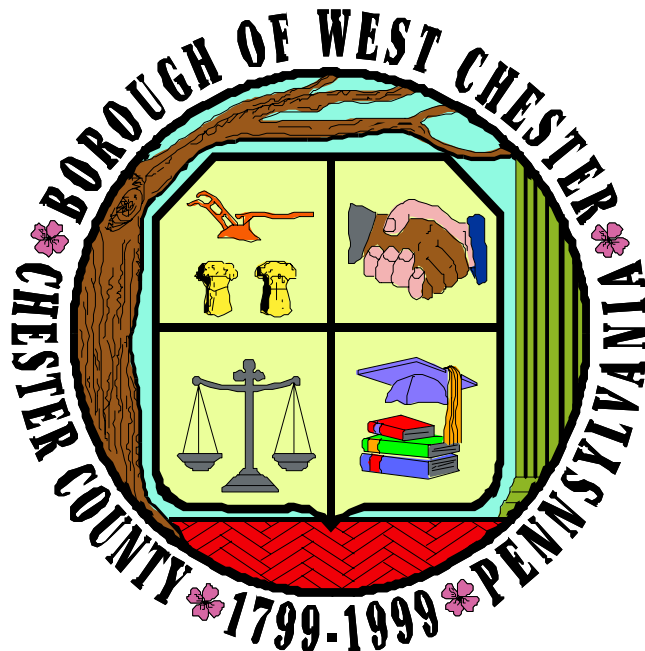

SYNOPSIS

It gives me great satisfaction to report that **serious crime in West Chester decreased a total of 9% during calendar year 2004**. As you may know, crime is classified, counted, and reported in two distinctly different categories. These categories are known by statisticians and researchers as Part I crime and Part II crime, respectively. Part I crimes consist of those crimes that one may consider to be the most serious crimes affecting society and are comprised of a very specific subset of crimes that are routinely reported to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and forwarded to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for comparison with other municipalities of similar size and demographics. Part II crimes, on the other hand, are defined as any crime other than Part I crime and are generally considered to be less serious crimes, even nuisance crimes, tending to impact the quality of life only of those specifically affected by this secondary level of crime.

I am pleased to report that **Part I crimes decreased 8%** overall during calendar year 2004 from 999 such crimes reported during 2003 to 924 such crimes during 2004. The importance of this statistic should be significant to our many and varied citizenry. For instance, many fears associated with crime may be reduced in the minds of West Chester's citizens and business owners in the knowledge that serious crime reported to and by our Department has actually and literally been reduced by 8% during the last calendar year. This is also an important statistic for those individuals considering moving their families and/or businesses into our community(s) as it is a statistic that can be compared nationwide against other municipalities of similar size and demographics and a statistic that is easily accessible by those seeking such information in their decision-making process. Down are the crimes of Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson. There has not been a reported Homicide in West Chester for over five 5 years.

In 2004 the West Chester Police Department reported a **14% increase in Part II crimes**. During the calendar year 2004 the department reported 1903 crimes in comparison to the 1654 reported in 2003. Although this figure is not reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for comparison purposes, it is a statistic that affects the overall quality of life of those of us living and/or working in West Chester. This 14% increase in reported Part II crimes can very realistically be viewed another way. For instance, we can say that there were 249 more victims of nuisance crime during 2004. Community sensitivity(s) coupled with proactive and aggressive enforcement of nuisance crimes resulted in a significant increase in Public Drunkenness, Noise Ordinance, Open Bottle Ordinance arrests, as well as increased number of Disorderly Conduct arrests. With the growing success and transition of our Central Business District there has been an increased demand for police services. Overall the police department handled 15% more calls for service in 2004 in comparison to 2003 and 25% more calls in 2004 in comparison to the year 2000. This increased volume of calls and/or requests for service is a 5-year trend. While there is a negligible amount of Part I crime in our business district there is identifiably an increased need for police services. With the advent of the popularity of our business establishments and the influx of patrons from throughout the tri-state area, as well as West Chester University, the demand has increased dramatically. These issues coupled with varying and often-related neighborhood issues presented the largest challenge to our department and community in 2004. The issues of pedestrian traffic and corridors, the density and number of rental properties as well as the current environmental conditions, community and neighborhood demographics and the institutional capacity of the police department to staff and meet the increased demands of its citizenry represent the continued challenges as we move into 2005. The community should be as pleased as I am with the enforcement efforts and activity of its police department in meeting this complex challenge in 2004.

Traffic accidents reported to and investigated by the West Chester Police Department (with the sub-categories of reportable accidents and non-reportable accidents) decreased by approximately 2% in 2004. In the calendar year 2004 the Department did not experience a single motor vehicle or pedestrian fatality.

In 2004 the department continued its efforts towards professional police accreditation through the statewide Pennsylvania Training Commission. The department continued to pioneer enforcement and programming initiatives recognized by the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association and the Pennsylvania League of Cities. In 2004 our department and the Mayor's Community-Police

Partnership Team reached a milestone becoming the first group in Pennsylvania to be recognized as a mediation group. The team promotes unity and cooperation accomplished through training and an enormous sense of community pride.

Lastly, I would like to acknowledge the Mayor of West Chester Richard Yoder and the members of the West Chester Borough Council for their continued support and approval of the police department's staffing levels. In the calendar year 2004 the police department had an official compliment of 45 officers. Four individual officers each missed a considerable amount of time from work for significant injuries and/or serious medical problems. Ptlm. Jeffrey Murray was released to active duty with the U. S. Marine Corps in 2004 and remained so at the end of the year. Ptlm. Murray has been released to active duty again in 2005. The department experienced three retirements in 2004. The department is currently three officers short and with your commitment the department is in the process of testing and filling those vacancies.

It is with great pride that I present this synopsis of the West Chester Police Department's Annual Report for the calendar year 2004. It is my sincere hope that this synopsis is both informative to you and useful to the various constituencies and individuals we are sworn and privileged to serve.

GENERAL STATISTICS 2002



The General Statistics for the West Chester Police Department during 2004 reveal a 15% increase in the number of calls-for-service for the past year and a 25% increase since 2000. 2004 general statistics also reveal that crime reported to the West Chester Police Department increased approximately 6% overall, with an 8% reduction in Part I crime and an approximate 14% increase in secondary crime. The significant decrease in serious crime points toward a continued positive outlook for the community with respect to providing a safe environment for our citizenry and our business community. The increase in calls-for-service, coupled by an increase in secondary crime is the biggest challenge for our police department and our community. The Police Department is extremely proud of our improvement(s) in public safety service and enforcement in our community. The elected officials and appointed leaders in our community(s) are encouraged to share our collective accomplishments and continue our work in a shared vision and goal of a safer community and better quality of life.

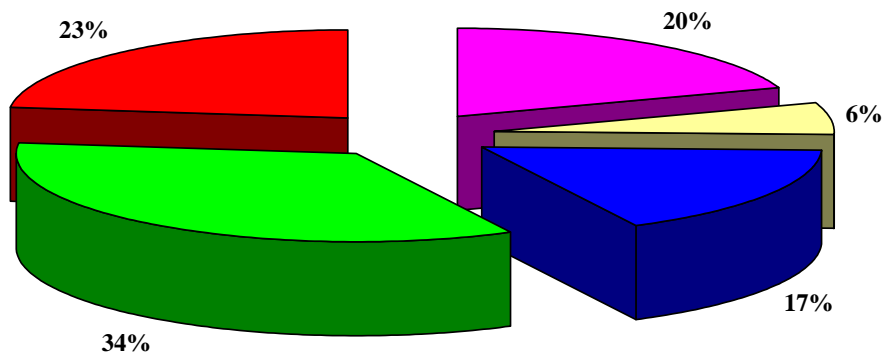

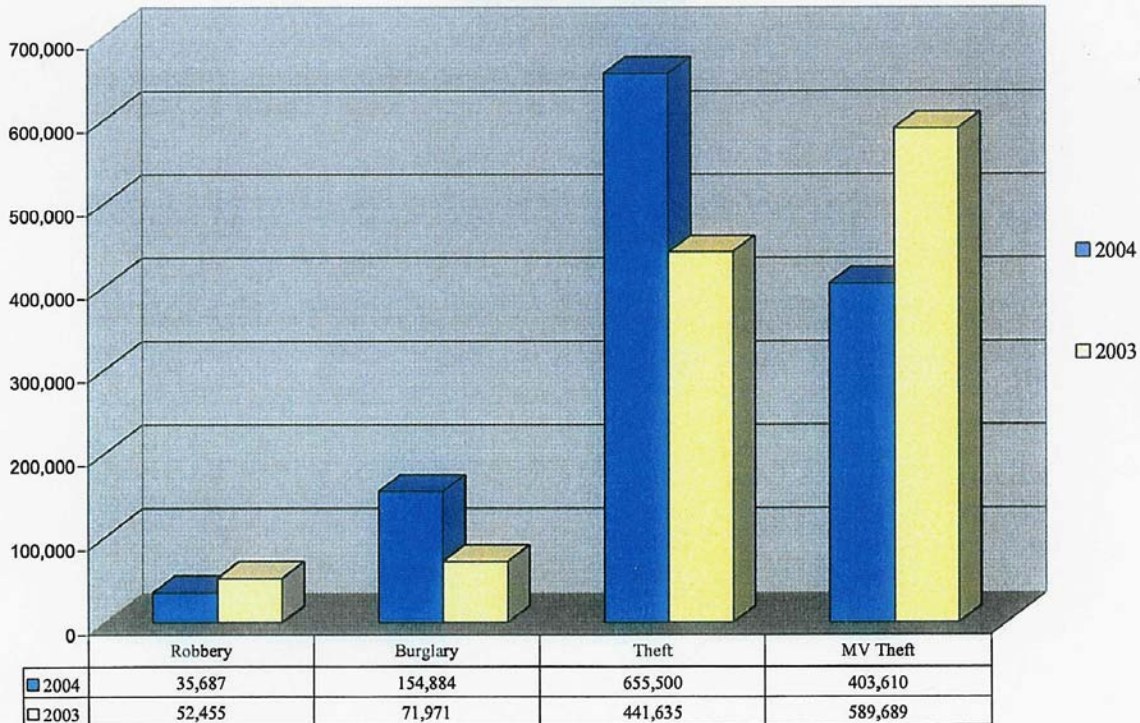


PROPERTY LOSS

Crime related property loss to residents and visitors of West Chester and East Bradford Township who were victimized by a Part 1 crime increased by approximately 6% during the calendar year 2004 from \$1,155,290 to \$1,230,752 an increase of \$74,832. During the same period residents and visitors of our communities realized an overall 8% reduction in Part-One crime.

ACCIDENT ANALYSIS



Overall, vehicle crashes reported to and investigated by the West Chester Police Department decreased 2% from 2003 to 2004, with a total of 19 fewer accidents occurring during 2004. However, the raw numbers do not depict an accurate account of the entire picture. Vehicle accidents, more particularly described as “vehicle crashes” as most accidents are not quite as “accidental” as one might suspect, should be divided into four categories: 1. Reportable Crashes; 2. Non-Reportable Crashes; and 3. Fatalities, and 4. Hit and Runs.

REPORTABLE CRASHES:

Reportable crashes are defined as those crashes in which the driver, vehicle occupant, pedestrian, or bicyclist is injured, or the damage to any vehicle is so severe as to render the vehicle inoperable. During the calendar year 2004, reportable crashes increased approximately 4% from 83 during 2003 to 86 during 2004.

NON-REPORTABLE CRASHES:

Non-reportable crashes are defined as the converse of reportable crashes. Stated another way, non-reportable crashes are those crashes where no one was injured and the vehicle was able to be removed from the crash scene under its own power. Although Commonwealth law does not require one to report these crashes to the police, some individuals and, more particularly, their insurance companies, request a police investigation nonetheless. As such, the police department can count those non-reportable crashes that are actually reported to the police, but there is no way to know what percent of these type crashes is reported or actually occur in the Borough or the Township. Those non-reportable crashes reported to the police department decreased by approximately 3% from 780 during 2003 to 750 during 2004.

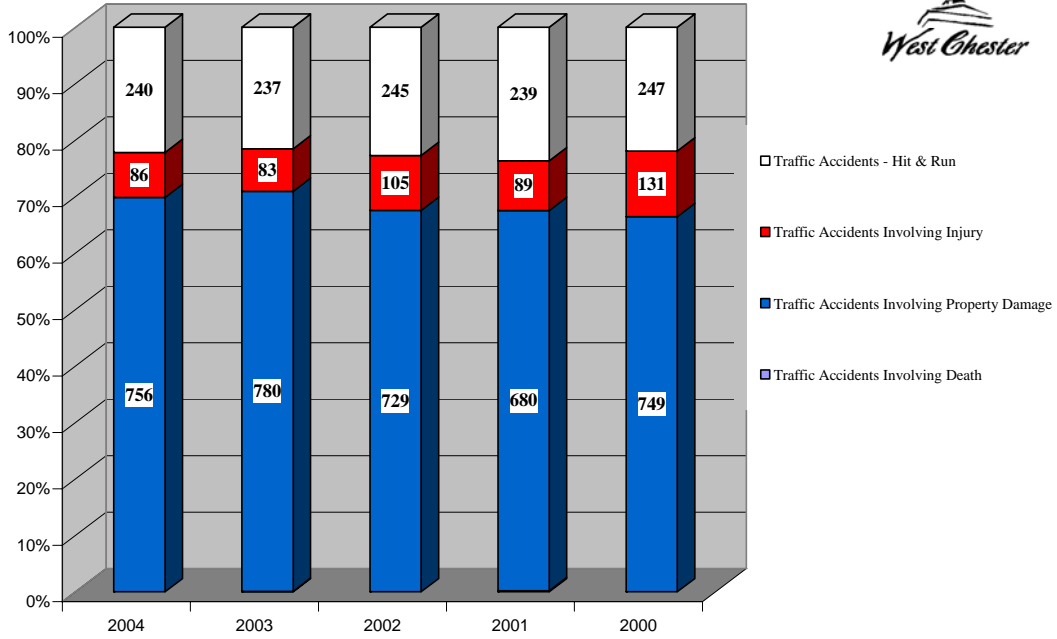
FATALITIES:

Fatal crashes decreased by 100% during 2004 from 1 during 2003 to 0 during the calendar year 2004.

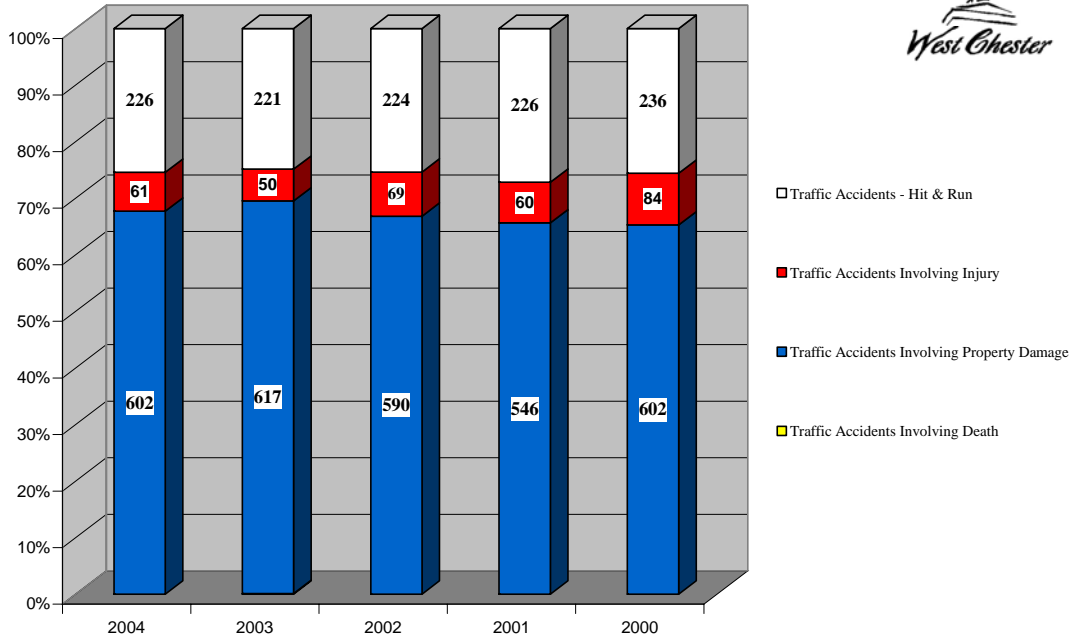
HIT AND RUN

As a general rule, the driver of any vehicle involved in an accident resulting in damage to a vehicle or other property shall immediately stop the vehicle at the scene of the accident or as close thereto as possible and shall remain at the scene of the accident until he has fulfilled the requirements as promulgated in the Pennsylvania Motor Vehicle Code, Title 75; relating to the duty to give/provide information and render aid if necessary. In too many instances individuals involved in motor vehicle crashes ignore their obligation and leave the scene of the "accident". Those hit and run crashes reported to the police department increased by approximately 1% from 237 during 2003 to 240 during 2004.

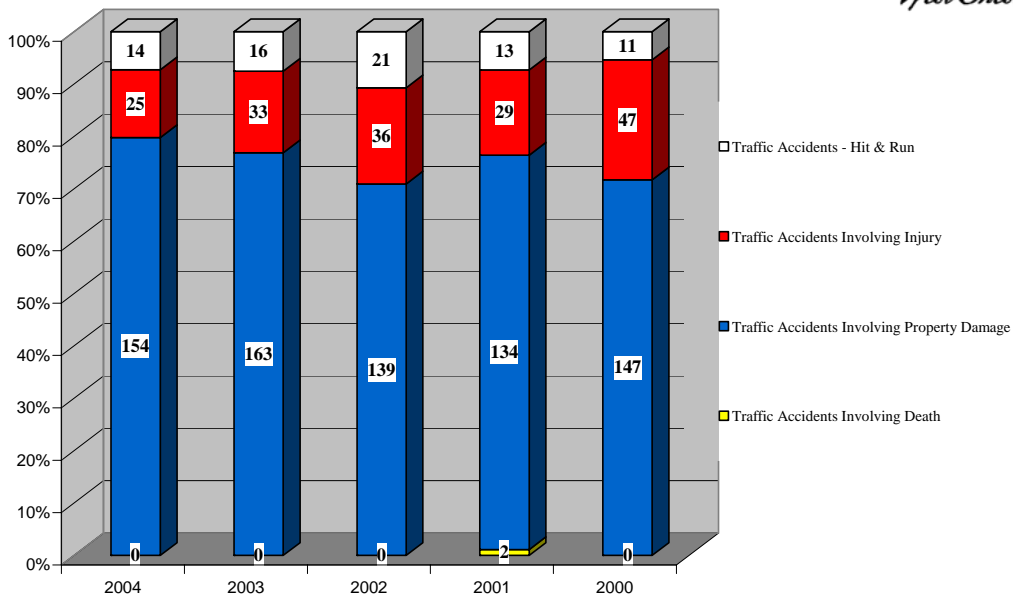
WEST CHESTER POLICE DEPARTMENT ACCIDENT INVESTIGATIONS

East Bradford Township**



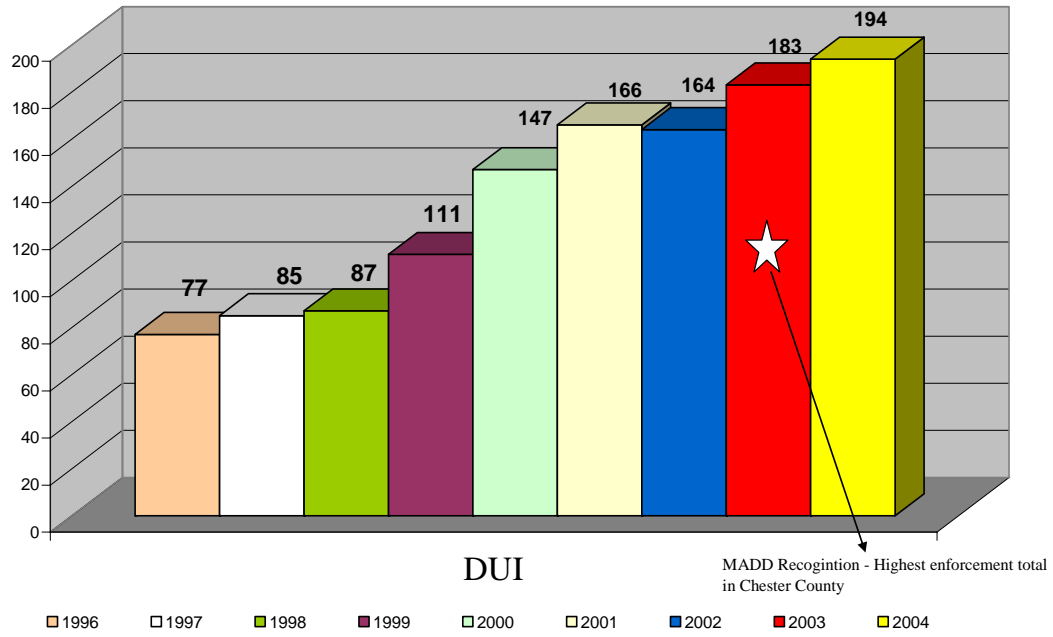


DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE



The West Chester Police Department places high emphasis on searching for DUI drivers in an attempt to lower fatalities in our service communities due to alcohol and/or drug related vehicle crashes and to lessen the overall personal injury and property loss due to vehicle crashes. During the calendar year 2003, the police department arrested 183 individuals for Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol or Drugs. That was the highest of any Chester County law enforcement agency and an achievement for which the police department was honored in 2004 by the Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) organization. During the calendar year 2004 the West Chester Police Department realized a 6% increase in DUI arrests by handling 194 such incidents. The increased number of liquor establishments in our community increases the probability and likelihood that a larger number of individuals will attempt to drive while intoxicated. Although statistics are not yet available from other Chester County law enforcement agencies, I suggest that our figures in this category are again the highest in Chester County.

WEST CHESTER POLICE DEPARTMENT DUI ENFORCEMENT





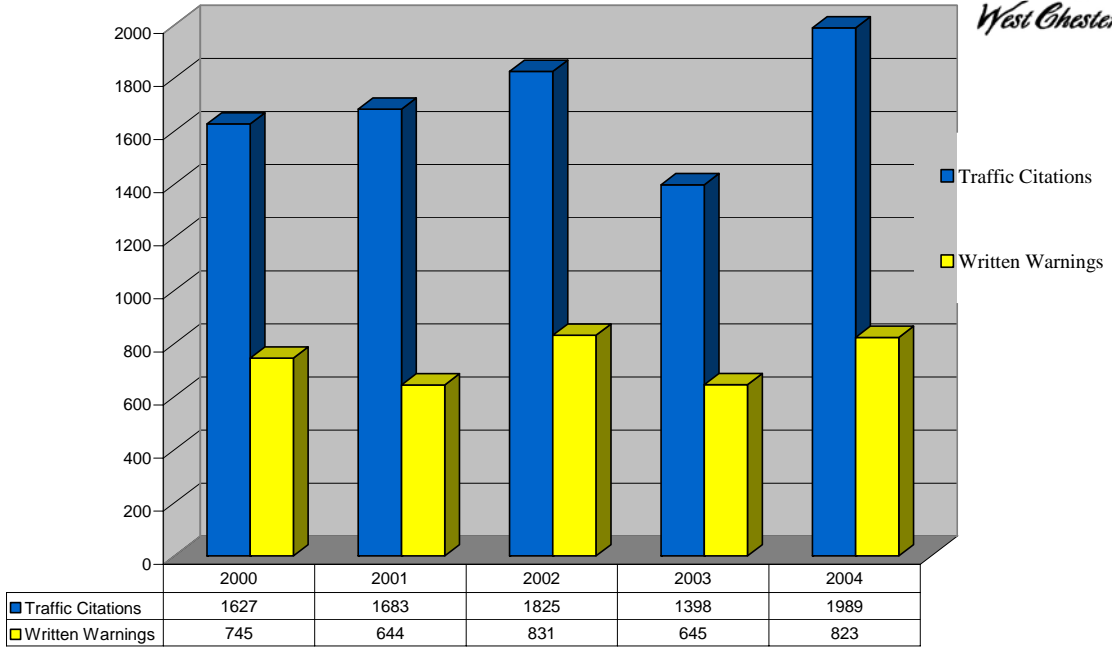
TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT STATISTICS



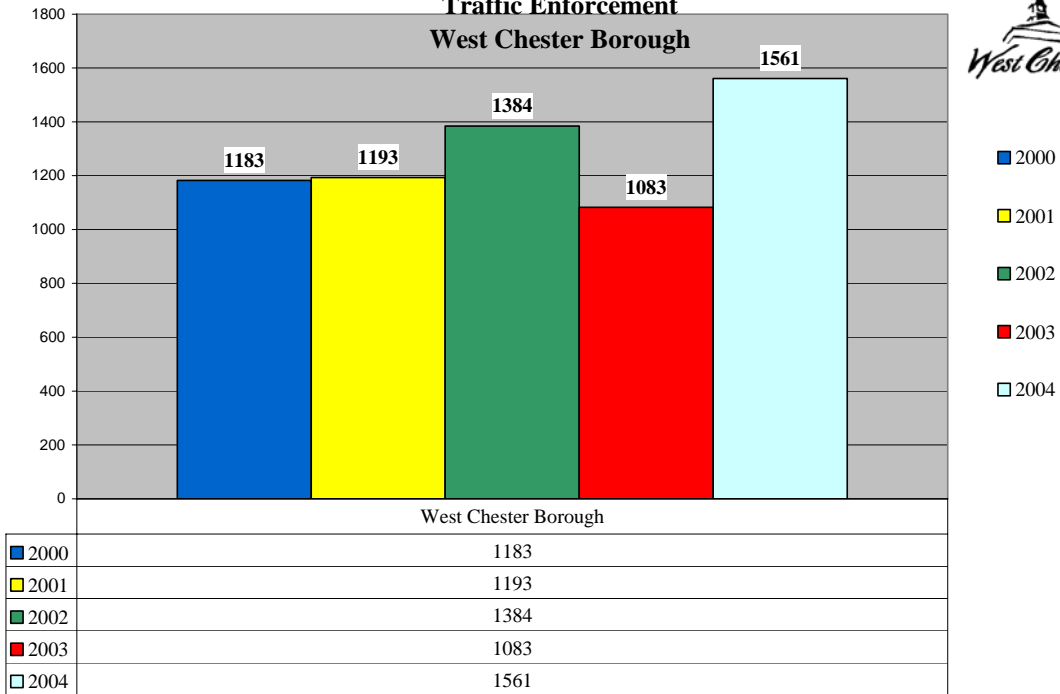
Specific emphasis was placed on the productivity of our uniformed officers during 2004 with high expectations for specific results. Traffic arrests issued by the West Chester Police Department increased 42% during calendar year 2004. The enforcement of our state vehicular laws is an essential and important service to the residents and visitors of our communities. The issuance of “written traffic warnings” increased 28% in the calendar year 2004. In addition to the department’s enforcement efforts the department increased it’s total number of “traffic details” in our service communities by 38%. In 2004 the department added computer hardware and software technology that will benefit our community in the assessment of current vehicular traffic and aid in future traffic planning in our communities and the surrounding communities.

The increased emphasis during 2004 on the Department’s traffic safety goals and objectives is a double edged sword and this special cautionary note should be recalled at the end of 2005 when next year’s annual report is presented. The cautionary note, specifically, has to do with the number of calls-for-service during 2004. Vehicle stops for traffic violations are not counted as a call-for-service. Each of the last five years has been marked by a significant increase in the Department’s calls-for-service. Additionally the department actively engages in the issuance of parking tickets for both local ordinance violations and state laws, (8,085 in 2004). The officers are required to satisfy daily court obligations at 5 separate locations, (3 District Courts, Common Pleas Court, Juvenile Court). The above stated factors in addition to the department’s level of staffing and staffing requirements significantly impact our traffic enforcement statistics. Our citizenry should be pleased with the efforts and productivity of our uniformed personnel in 2004.

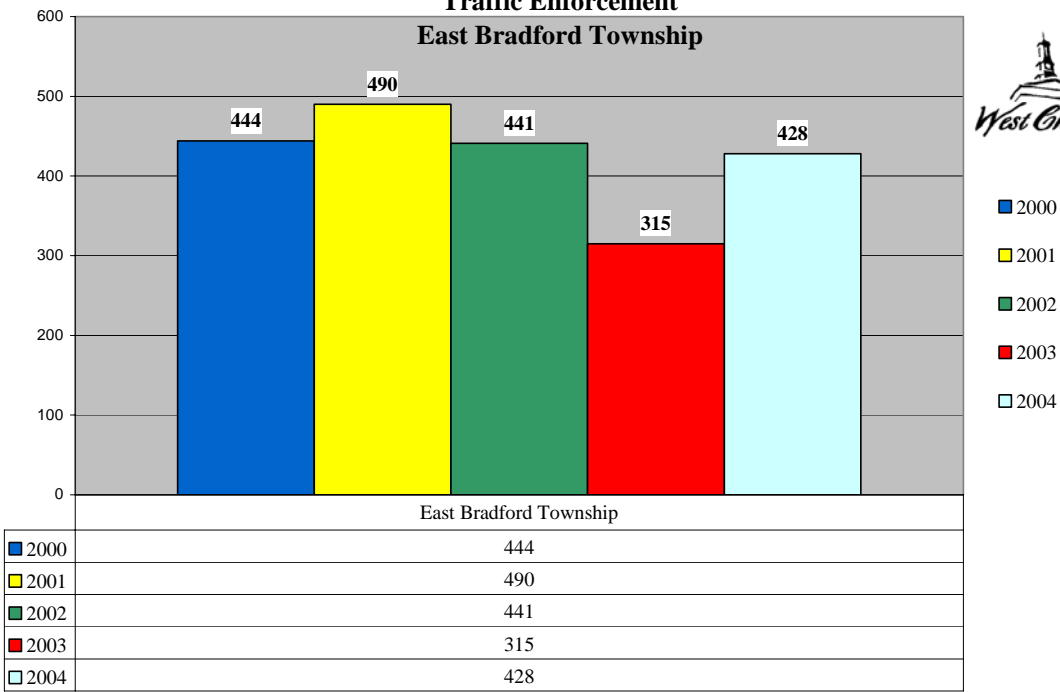

Traffic Enforcement**



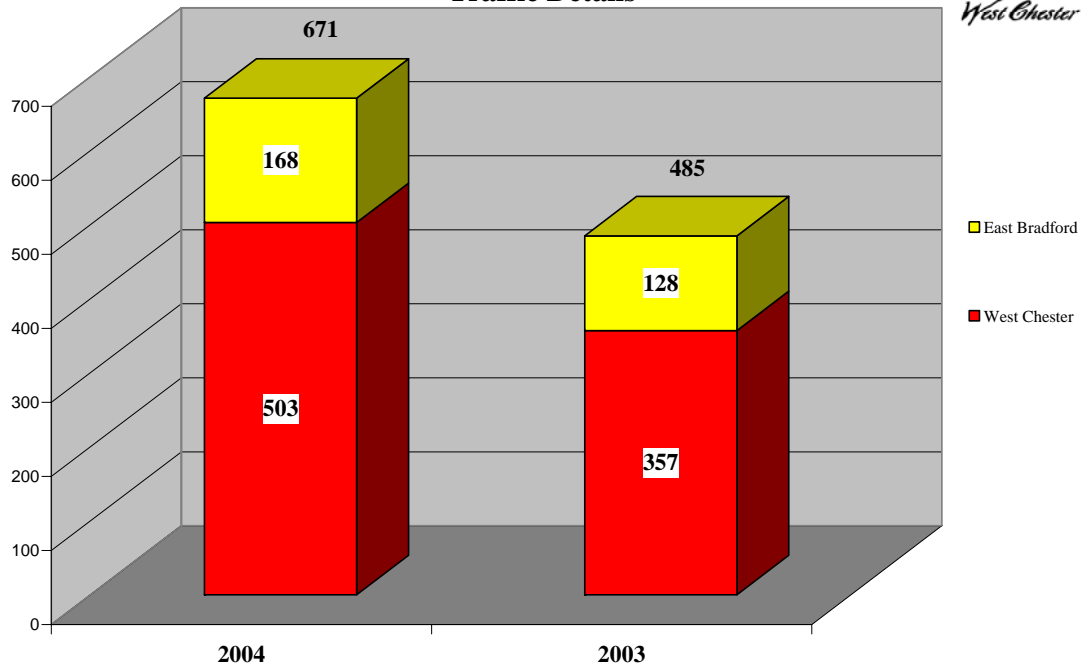

West Chester Borough**



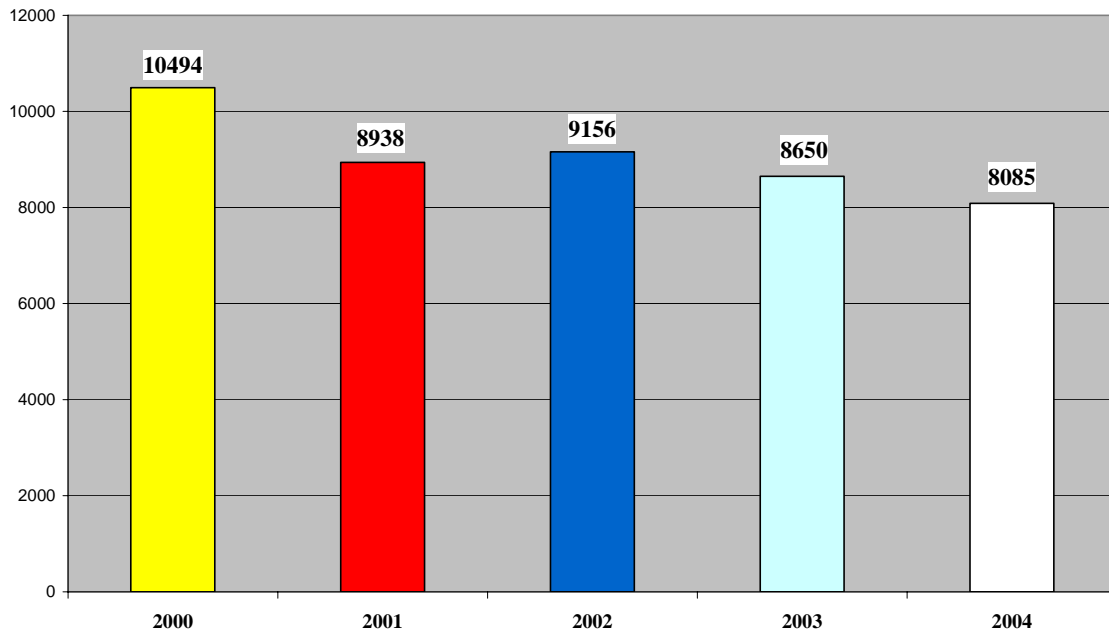

WEST CHESTER POLICE DEPARTMENT Parking Enforcement



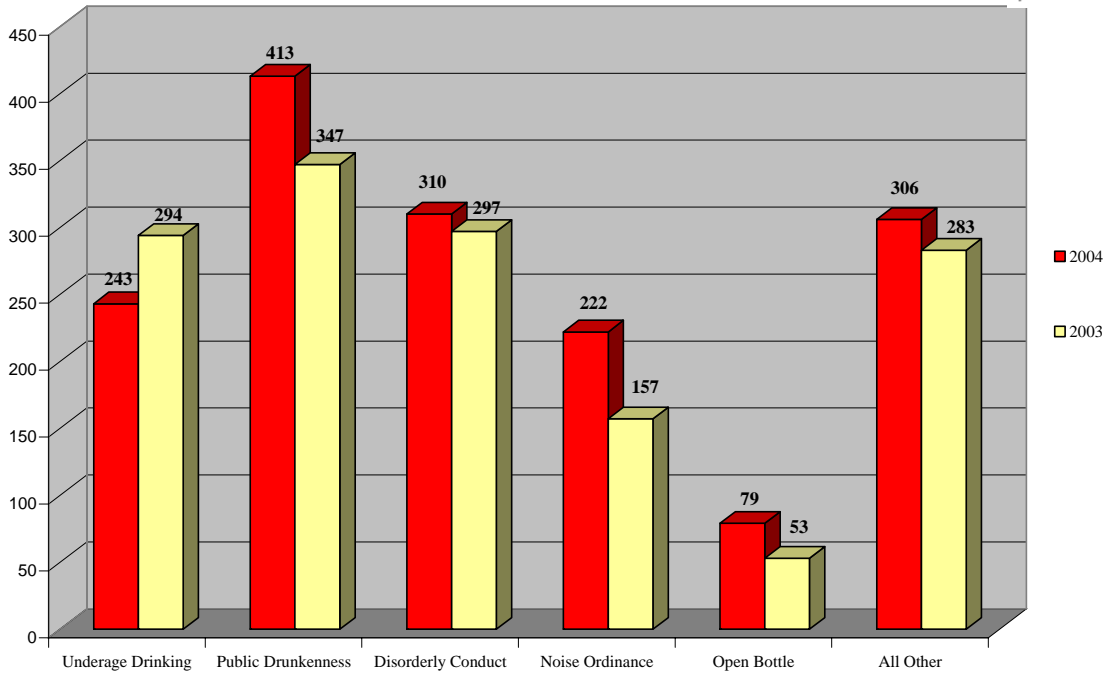


NON-TRAFFIC CITATIONS

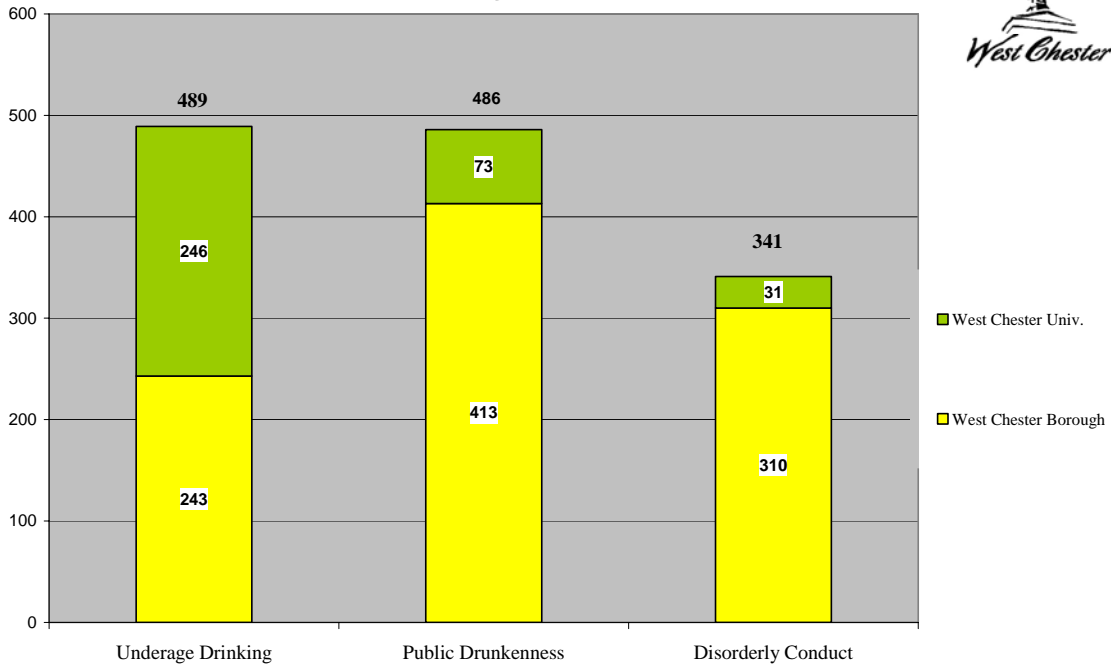


Non-traffic citations are the official name in Pennsylvania for the issuance of a criminal summons for violation of a summary criminal offense, the lowest of all criminal offenses in the Commonwealth. More specifically, it is similar to a traffic ticket in that a police officer may stop an individual and issue a summons on a minor criminal offense, such as a quality of life violation, or mail the summons to the offender's residence at a later date. During 2004, the West Chester Police Department issued 1,573 such criminal summons for minor quality of life violations, such as disorderly conduct and similar offenses. This represents a 9% increase in the issuance of summons from 2003. During the calendar year 2004 the department was recognized for, and presented, its enforcement strategies and programs to the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association and the Pennsylvania League of Cities and Municipalities.

ALARM ACTIVATION MANAGEMNT

In 2004 the Department managed alarm activations and activity for both West Chester Borough and East Bradford Township. The following information was accurate as of January 1, 2005. The Borough collected \$12,725 in false alarm fines in the Borough and \$4,100 in fines for East Bradford Township. The implementation of an automated Alarm enforcement program has resulted in the reduction of false alarms and the required police response in each consecutive year since the inception of this program in 1999-2000. The Township experienced a reduction in 2004 the first full year the department automated and managed the alarm enforcement program.

2004 was very busy and productive year for our communications unit, and our chief communications and technology officer. Several projects were started and completed during the year, which are detailed in this report.

Police Radio Communication System

The department began exploration of an upgraded communications system in September 2002. This extensive and complicated project was finally completed in November of 2004 when the department accepted the installation from Motorola and entered our one (1) year warranty phase. The upgraded system allows the West Chester Police Department the ability to communicate directly with police officers in West Goshen, West Chester University, the Pennsylvania State Police and Chester County 911 center. Additionally the system permits the use of digital transmission and/or technology. These features and the systems functionality helps ensure the safety of our officers and the public they serve.

GIS

In early 2004 the department completed a GIS project in partnership with Chester County to connect geographical information with the West Chester Police Department's crime data (Visual Alert) in an effort to make it possible to create crime maps for reporting and planning purposes. This project has been completed and crime and statistical reports can now be produced.

In 2004 employee(s) attended training at ESRI Incorporated and received certification in the following areas:

- Introduction to ArcGIS I
- Introduction to ArcGIS II

Video Surveillance System

The department's video surveillance system was upgraded from a VHS system to a digital (DVD or CD) system. The improvements that this new system provides the police department are:

- More efficient searches from any computer on the local area network.
- The ability to save incidents on a CD-R or DVD disc for playback on any computer with a CD or DVD drive.
- Enhanced security. There is no longer the need for videotapes to be rotated and placed in and out of service.
- The VHS equipment was not placed out of service and now acts as a back up to the new digital equipment offering our department a back-up system for the video, which was not available prior to this installation.

Emergency Operations

As planned in late 2004, Room 240 in West Chester Borough Hall was pre-planned as an Emergency Operations Room. The following were purchased and installed:

- 3 phone lines installed
- 2 network [local area network] lines installed.
- 3 single phones purchased and labeled.
- 3 power point projectors purchased.
- 1 desktop workstation purchased.
- 2 laptops purchased.

The emergency operations room was placed into service one time in 2004 (Correa kidnapping) and the department was able to have it in service with computer/network access and telecommunications service to over 200 federal, state and municipal officers in less than one hour.

Dispatch

Full Time Dispatch staffing did not change in 2004. Full Time personnel have remained consistent without any turnover since July 2000. Two part time dispatchers worked occasionally throughout 2004. Upon reviewing this situation the department found that these two part time employees were working so inconsistently that they could not be depended on to cover shifts or be of any true asset to the full-time staff. An additional part-time dispatcher was hired in late 2004 and began training in November. All of the hours that had been given to the previous two part time dispatchers will be assigned to this employee 2005 and she will have a set schedule. This employee is also available to start as a full time dispatcher should a vacancy occur. This was not the case with the previous two (2) part time employees.

The dispatchers performed their jobs in a dependable and professional manner throughout the year and we are very proud of each and every one of them. There were no major complaints directed towards the dispatch personnel either by their co-workers (police officers) or the citizens they serve.

Information Technology

Throughout the year information technology assistance and management was provided to all of the departments and offices in our municipality including the Public Works Department and both Sewer Plants.

As planned several information technology projects were started and completed during 2004.

As planned several technology projects were started and completed during 2004.

These projects included:

- The replacement of the borough's exchange (mail) server.
- Improving the security and functionality of the three (3) borough servers with the installation of a secure server cabinet. All servers are now housed in a secure; self powered and insulated cabinet that is located in the police records office.
- The addition of an independent uninterrupted power supply (UPS) for the borough's three (3) servers.
- The purchase and installation of information technology software which provides all employees with the ability to enter "work orders" which are available through the "Track-It" software as well as Microsoft Outlook.
- The addition of a back-up file server, which is on stand-by at the East Bradford Township Building. The exchange server that had been retired earlier in the year was re-formatted and setup for this task. This additional back-up server should be in service in 2005.
- Our network remains protected by the ATT managed firewall system, Symantec's Corporate Norton Anti-Virus and the Postini filtering system. Our network was not down at anytime during 2004 as a result of an infection or Trojan horse event.

- Uninterrupted Power Supplies were installed at the server and most computers at Public Works.
- New computer installed and setup for the Public Works Director.
- Two (2) new computers installed and setup at the Taylor Run Sewer plant.
- As planned several computers were upgraded in the municipal building in 2004.

Telecommunications

As a result of continued unreliable service the police department recommended a switch to a new service provider for our telecommunications system in April 2004. Our research found that there was only one area dealer who provided service on our equipment. This service provider was interviewed and we entered into a service contract with their firm. The telecommunications system continues to be serviced by the new vendor. Although the telephone system performed well throughout 2004, it is aging and service will become challenging in the near future. We have begun research in the direction of upgrading or replacing this system at some point in the future.

Uninterrupted Power Supply – Municipal Building

In July 2004, the municipal building's uninterrupted power supply failed, leaving the building without UPS protection for several weeks. The service provider was contacted and stated that 32 new batteries were needed and installation would be at least 30 days away. It is important to note that the vendors main office is now located in California which accounts for their (unacceptable) delays in service. A new vendor was contacted and provided new batteries and installation within a week. This UPS unit is essential to the municipal building; however it is vital to the police department emergency dispatch operations. The original UPS system is in need of replacement and working together with the new vendor and the Department of Public Works a planned replacement of the UPS system will be completed in 2005.

CRIMINAL DIVISION

In 2004 four (4) investigators, two (2) Narcotics Officers, and one (1) Juvenile Officer staffed the Criminal Division. During 2004 the Criminal Division investigated 180 cases, clearing 161 cases. 53 arrests were made as a result of their investigations. Each case and arrest made by the criminal unit is significant to the victim(s) and our community. One of the more noteworthy cases the unit investigated in 2004 was the Correa Kidnapping, a case involving the coordinated efforts of over 200 federal, state and local law enforcement officers. The case concluded with the successful arrest of three individuals, and the recovery and safe return of the victim. The Correa matter is now being federally prosecuted. In addition to the kidnapping charges the actors involved face additional charges of firing upon, and at, local and federal officers. The Department was recognized at local, state and federal levels for its management and investigation of this incident. In addition to the traditional forms of criminal investigation the unit has and continues to investigate new forms of serious criminal activity requiring specialized skills and training (Computer, internet, fraud, etc).

The Criminal Division handled over 900 items of evidence and upgraded the evidence room. The evidence facility was computerized and a bar code system was implemented to improve the efficiency of evidence and property retrieval. A video storage cabinet, gun storage lockers, and computerized station were added to enhance the efficiency and retrieval of those items and to transition the evidence room to meet the changing needs of the department. The Criminal Division Office was modified to create additional and more efficient workspace for the investigators in 2004.

In 2004 the West Chester Police Department Narcotics Unit was involved in significant number of major drug investigations. These investigations impacted the communities we serve and in many instance our surrounding communities. The most significant and comprehensive investigation the West Chester Police Department Drug Unit investigated was the 340 W. Washington Street case. This investigation was a two (2) year comprehensive joint and multi-jurisdictional drug investigation initiated by the West

Chester Narcotics unit and involved the Pennsylvania State Police, the Chester County District Attorney's office, the Delaware State Police, New Castle County, DE police and other municipal agencies. The original focus of the investigation was centered in and around the area of 300 Block of West Washington St. in the Borough. During the course of the investigation it became apparent that the activity was a well defined, widespread, and structured enterprise with ties, participants and illegal activities in various jurisdictions in Chester County, as well as outside the Commonwealth. Significant amounts of cocaine, ecstasy, marijuana, and PCP- laced marijuana were seized during the investigation. Numerous vehicles, property and household belongings were confiscated. This investigation culminated with the arrest of numerous individuals responsible for approximately 60% of the cocaine and drug traffic in our municipality. It was the largest single investigation ever conducted in West Chester Borough. The drug unit also disrupted a major drug operation at 118 N. New Street and the associated narcotics traffic in the area of New & Chestnut Street. As evidenced by the number of investigations and the different agencies involved in our investigations the community should understand that our individual and coordinated efforts were, and will continue to be, brought to accomplish our specific narcotics enforcement goals.

The juvenile officer is the Liaison between our schools, courts and family agencies. The juvenile officer investigated over 46 Juvenile cases that resulted in arrests and referrals to various county agencies. The juvenile officer assisted the Patrol Division with a large number of Juvenile related problems and criminal activity. At the request of the West Chester Area School District Administration the juvenile office coordinated the drug sweep by the West Chester Police Department at Henderson High School in 2004. The juvenile office works directly with the West Chester Police Athletic League and serves on its board of directors. The juvenile officer is routinely involved with the West Chester Recreation Department and similar agencies; helping to promote unity and understanding between the community and the West Chester Police Department. In 2004 the juvenile officer also managed, planned, and coordinated DARE training in our elementary schools. This involved the supervision of six DARE officers with the continued support of the West Cheater Area School District.

ERT

The objective of the West Chester Regional Emergency Response Team (ERT) and its primary responsibility is to provide and maintain a specially trained unit to resolve those incidents generally beyond the normal scope of regular patrol personnel and equipment.

Personnel:

In 2004 the West Chester Regional ERT was comprised of forty (40) well-trained police officers from five (5) separate jurisdictions; West Chester (11), West Goshen (12), Westtown-East Goshen (11), Easttown (3), Uwchlan (4) and a five (5) member board of Chiefs. The compliment of officers consists of seven (7) highly trained negotiators and four (4) equally trained snipers.

Calls for Service:

The West Chester Regional ERT was activated and responded to four (4) incidents in the calendar year 2004. Each call for service and/or operation was successful in its planning, implementation and execution. Each resulted in a successful outcome.

In addition to the calls-for-service the team participated in mock exercises during the calendar year 2004.

Training:

During the calendar year 2004 the West Chester Regional ERT engaged in the following types of exercises:

Tactical: dynamic entry, wooded area searches, policy/procedure, stress induced shooting, night-time wooded area searches, radio repairs during operations, munitions training with breaching, distraction and gas rounds- certifying officers, hostage rescue training, gas exposure training preceded by gas munitions training and barricaded person scenarios. Additionally the entire team was involved in intensive tactical training at Fort Indian Town Gap and mock call-outs to test preparation and readiness. The monthly training exercises always include physical training. This training included, but was not limited to; rugged cross country running, sprinting, hill training, sit-ups, pull-ups, leg lifts, jumping jacks and obstacle courses including an officer down rescue. Every month the ERT engages in range training. This training included the following in 2004; combat course(s), qualifications with all weapons systems, gas mask shooting qualifications, weapons nomenclature class(s) on the AR-15 and pistol shooting, pistol shooting on obstacle course(s). Individual officers attended specialized schools including, Negotiator's Basic School, Hostage Rescue School and the NTOA SWAT Basic Training School.

Vehicles:

The West Chester ERT currently has been assigned and utilizes two (2) vehicles:

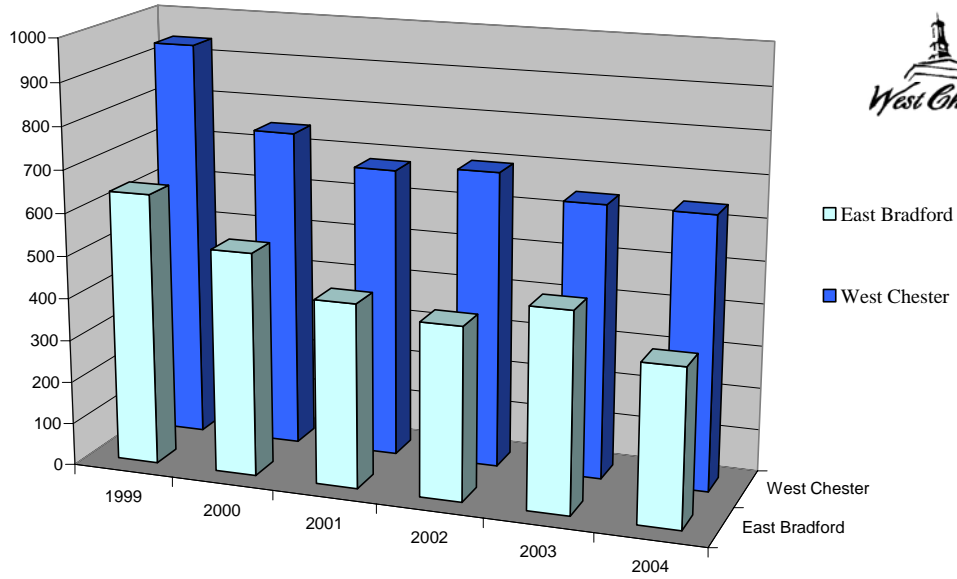
RECORDS DIVISION

The West Chester Police Department Records Division was staffed with two (2) full-time employees in 2004. The second full time Records Clerk position was filled in May 2004 after a lengthy vacancy filling a critical need for the department.

During the year of 2004 the West Chester Police Department Records Division accomplished the following:

1. The court ordered expungement of over 102 criminal history files.
2. The collection of \$11,100 in fees for reports.
3. Assisted the Chester County District Attorney's Office by collating and processing over 920 case files requested by the Chester County District Attorney's Office.
4. In compliance with the Municipal Records Act the West Chester Police Department Records Division archived old UCR Complaint Cards, Citations, and duplicate incident reports.
5. The West Chester Police Department Records Division separately computerized and documented all use of force incidents, prisoner logs and custody information as well as special occurrence forms for the administrative staff for the purposes of administrative review and assessment.
6. The West Chester Police Department Records Division also collated and filed over 3,000 crime reports, over 1,000 accident reports, processed over 3,500 summonses and managed court scheduling for police personnel.

PERSONNEL ASSIGNMENTS



The current personnel allotment for the West Chester Police Department is 55 individuals. Of those 45 are sworn personnel (police officers) and 10 are staff support (non-sworn personnel). With respect to the sworn personnel, 78% are assigned to the patrol function to respond to calls-for-service. Of the remaining 22%, 15% are assigned to the criminal investigative function and conduct follow-up investigations for those assigned to the patrol function to allow them additional time to perform proactive patrols. The remaining 7% are the administration staff in the police department, including the Chief of Police and two Lieutenants, all of whom will from time to time respond to calls-for-service and/or provide assistance to those assigned to the criminal and patrol functions. The following is a statistical analysis of personnel assignments in the police Department:

When reviewing personnel assignments and distribution within the West Chester Police Department it is important to consider the information in context. In the calendar year 2004, four individual officers each missed a considerable amount of time from work for significant injuries and/or serious medical problems. Ptlm. Jeffrey Murray was released to active duty with the U. S. Marine Corps in January 2004 and remained so at the end of the year. Ptlm. Murray has been released to active duty again in 2005. Sgt. Daniel Dixon and Ptlm. Clifford Downward retired from the Department after only working part of the year and Sgt. Euler retired from the Department on December 31, 2004. Ptlm. McGeehan, McCarthy, Davis, DiNunzio, Cugino, and Parker were hired in 2004. Ptl. Cugino and Parker attended the police academy and began their service with our Department in December 2004. The West Chester Police Department will begin the calendar year three individuals short of its full compliment with one additional officer on in-active status.
