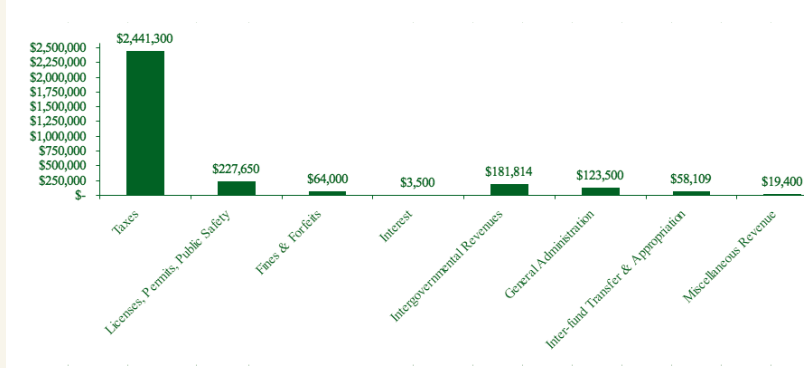

2011 Budget Summary

The East Bradford Township Board of Supervisors approved the 2011 budget package at its December 14, 2010 meeting. The 2011 budget consists of six (6) distinct budgets – general, sewer, highway, liquid fuels, capital and open space.

General Fund

The **General Fund** represents the principal operating fund for the Township (including police and fire protection, parks, trails and recreation, planning and zoning, codes enforcement and engineering, public works (roads), legal, administration, and litter control). The final 2011 general fund budget is balanced utilizing an appropriation from the prior year carry forward fund balance (\$13,384). The two most important general fund receipts – earned income tax and real estate transfer tax – have exhibited a flattening and decline, respectively, over the past several years. This is projected to continue in 2011. The 2011 general fund budget includes the maintenance of all current essential service levels including police, fire and emergency services and road maintenance.



Roadside litter control service is eliminated for 2011. A 1.5% employee uniform

wage adjustment is included in the 2011 budget (0% in 2010). There is no base contribution to the capital reserve fund for 2011 (but a contribution is possible pending review at the end of 2011 and dependent upon budget performance).

The employee pension plan minimum required contribution, year four police services agreement with West Chester Borough, fire service agreements, and employee health insurance represent significant fixed expenses. For 2011 many line expense items were decreased, one part time position was eliminated and a recommendation for an

additional public works employee was deferred. General fund budgeted receipts for 2011, netting out the appropriation from the prior year carry forward fund balance, projects an estimated decrease in revenues of -1.4% while 2011 general fund expenditures is projected to decrease -1.9% compared with 2010.

Sewer Fund

The **Sewer Fund** is a utility fund established to provide public sewer service to over 1,100 customers in the Township through an inter-municipal agreement with the Borough of West Chester. The sewer fund includes both an operating account and a capital reserve account, which should be considered before assessing annual fund performance. The 2011 sewer fund includes no rate increase in sewer user fees after three prior consecutive year rate increases. The update to the Township Act 537 Sewage Facilities Plan continues and is expected to be completed in 2011.

Highway Improvement Fund

The **Highway Improvement Fund** is a proprietary fund established for design and construction of road improvements in the Township. The Highway Improvement Fund generally functions as a capital improvement and contingency fund for roads and related infrastructure. Revenues are derived from developers' contributions. In recent years, with less development activity, the fund balance is decreasing. The Board of Supervisors authorized road maintenance and related projects for 2011 (highway improvement and liquid fuels funds – see below) based upon an October 2010 road inspection. The Township was notified by

PADOT in October that the liquid fuels annual allocation from the Commonwealth will again decrease for the third consecutive year due to declining fuel tax receipts and related to the economic conditions.

State Liquid Fuels Fund

Receipts for the **State Liquid Fuels Fund** are provided by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania from (gas) tax disbursed annually to all municipalities. The receipts are based upon Township road miles and population. Use of the fund is limited to road maintenance/reconstruction and related equipment purchases.

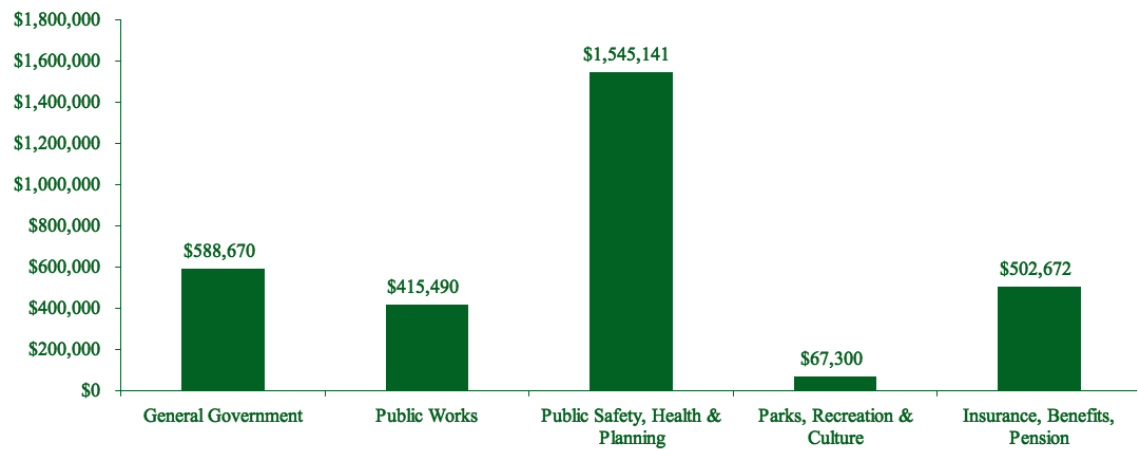
Capital Reserve Fund

The **Capital Reserve Fund** is comprised of appropriated monies that are used for capital projects, major equipment purchase/replacements, etc. This fund serves a complementary function to the general fund together with the five-year

of the Township building HVAC system, continued trail development, and advancement of the Scennelltown / Mt. Bradford recreational improvements. The public works garage expansion bids received in October were rejected and the project was cancelled.

Open Space Fund

Finally, the **Open Space Fund**, established in 1999, is funded from the open space preservation tax (¼ of 1% on earned income) pursuant to PA Act 153 (Open Space Preservation Act). Expenditures are restricted to acquisition of interests in real property and costs associated with these activities. The Open Space Fund represents the only source of Township debt at this time. The open space fund budget for 2011 was carefully reviewed by the Supervisors to establish realistic spending estimates and priorities.

Copes Bridge has Re-Opened

As I am sure most of you are aware, Copes Bridge has reopened after being rehabilitated for the past year. PennDOT reopened the Bridge on March 31 after several weather delays, much to the delight of the many people who had to find a new route while it was closed.

The Bridge which crosses over the east branch of the Brandywine Creek was originally built in 1807 and was rehabilitated in 1927, with additional structural repairs made in 1996 and again in 2002. The Bridge was rated structurally deficient prior to the start of construction.

Its length of 171 feet and width of 25 feet were not altered by the improvement project, which included restoration, strengthening and preservation of the historic character of this three span stone masonry arch bridge. The Bridge is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is a contributing element to the Taylor – Cope Historic District.

J. D. Eckmann, Inc. of Atglen, Chester County was the general contractor for the project, for the total contract price of \$3,431,686. which was 100% financed with state funds.

Is Your House Number Properly Posted for Your Safety?

Did you know that Chapter 46 of the Code of the Township of East Bradford requires all buildings, residential and commercial, to post the street address numbers of the property on the building's front or otherwise separately mounted in the front yard of the property? The numbers should be Arabic in design, have a minimum height of three inches and be mounted in a secure fashion to the principal building's front or in an approved manner on a post, wall or mailbox in the front yard of the premises. The numbers should be visible from the center line of the street and not obstructed by trees, shrubs or other obstructions. If you have a driveway accessing more than one house, all numbers should be posted at the entrance of the driveway at the main road and also where the driveways split off to each home. LEARN HOW YOU CAN BE THE SOLUTION TO STORMWATER POLLUTION

Polluted stormwater run-off is the greatest threat to clean water. Practice these healthy household habits and you will be the solution to stormwater pollution.

- 1 Keep your nearest storm drain clear of debris and litter.
- 2 Never dump anything down a storm drain.
- 3 Use fertilizers sparingly.
- 4 Use pesticides only when necessary.
- 5 Do not blow grass clippings or leaves into the street.
- 6 Sweep up yard debris rather than hosing down paved areas.
- 7 Compost or recycle yard waste.
- 8 Pick up pet waste and dispose of it properly.

Facts:

• One mature tree reduces stormwater runoff by over 1,000 gallons per year! And trees renew our air supply by absorbing carbon dioxide and producing oxygen. • For every ton of paper recycled, 17 trees are saved from being cut down to produce new paper. • Americans use 2,500,000 plastic bottles every hour! Most of them are thrown away. • If disposed of improperly, a single quart of motor oil can contaminate up to 2,000,000 gallons of fresh water. • It's illegal to blow, sweep or place grass clippings or leaves into the street or storm water system. This can clog storm water drains and cause flooding.

- 9 Use a commercial car wash or wash your car on an unpaved area.
- 10 Service your car regularly to prevent leaks onto paved areas.
- 11 Dispose of household hazardous waste at designated collection locations.
- 12 Produce less waste – reduce, reuse, recycle.
- 13 Purchase and use nontoxic, biodegradable, recycled or recyclable products when ever possible.
- 14 Have your septic tank pumped and system inspected every 3 years (*Twp. requirement*).

Township Environmental Ordinances

In 2006, the Township adopted new ordinances regulating grading operations, certain tree removal activities and protection of lands near streams (riparian buffer areas) to meet Federal and State requirements to improve the water quality in our streams. If you are planning any earthmoving operations, removal of trees or any activities within riparian buffer areas, be sure to contact the Township to find out if the activity is allowed, and acquire any necessary Township permits. The ordinances can be obtained at the Township building or on the internet at www.eastbradford.org under Code of the Township.

The Township will be undergoing an investigation of several reported potential violations in the Township in the near future. If you think you may be conducting an activity that is in violation of the Code or without the appropriate permits, please contact the Township Immediately for instructions on permit acquisitions to avoid any remedies that may involve fines or other penalties administered by the Township.

On Lot Sewage System Maintenance Program

This maintenance program requires septic owners to pump their system every three (3) years. Most septic systems have enough space for approximately 3 years worth of accumulation. Having your system pumped approximately every 3 years will extend the life of your system and could save you thousands of dollars in future repairs. Failing septic systems can contaminate drinking water, as well as nearby lakes and streams. Regular pumping will protect your investment and the quality of life in your community. Copies of Ordinance #7-2004 are available at the Township office. The

following points summarize important elements of the ordinance:

By December 31, 2010, and every three years thereafter, each on-lot system in East Bradford Township must be pumped out by a licensed hauler. Contact the Chester County Health Department for a list of licensed haulers at (610) 344-6225 or cchd@chesco.org.

Property owners must direct the hauler to report the pumping to the Chester County Health Department's central database. There is no charge for the administration of this ordinance. However, property owners

who fail to have their system pumped within the three (3) year period will be charged a \$25 administration fee. Continued non compliance with the provisions of this ordinance may be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$300 and not more than \$2,000 plus costs.

If the Township becomes aware of a system that is malfunctioning, it will be reported to the Chester County Health Department. All repairs and replacements require a permit from the Health Department. Contact the Township at 610-436-5108 with any questions.

Leash Laws in East Bradford Township Parks and Open Spaces

The Township has received numerous complaints about dogs running loose in the Township Parks. The Township will be enforcing the leash law regulations in upcoming months.

Regulations for Parks & Open Spaces:

East Bradford Park, Copeland School Park and Jane I. Reed Park & Timber Top Farm: *Pets must be kept on a leash six feet or shorter and under control of a responsible person at all times. No pets are allowed on any playgrounds, ball fields, volleyball or tennis courts at any time. Pet owners are required to clean up after their pets and deposit any used pet waste bags in a trash receptacle.*

Shaw's Bridge Park, Paradise Valley Nature Area, Harry J. Waite Nature Area, Ingram's Mill Nature Area, Harmony Hill Nature Area & Sugar's Bridge Nature Area:

Pets must be kept under control by a responsible person at all times and use of a leash is required when other users are in the vicinity. Allowing pets to run loose and disturb other users may cause the pet owner and pet to be required to leave the property.

Violations & Penalties:

Anyone who violates the rules and regulations commits a summary offense with action brought before the District Justice, with fines not exceeding \$1,000 and/or imprisonment for a period not more than 90 days. The full regulations can be found at eastbradford.org under Codes of the Township, Section 22 Parks and Open Space.

When a Barking Dog Becomes a Nuisance

With spring in the air, I am noticing the howl and yowl of neighborhood dogs. This seems like a good time to revisit an old issue—the dog that barks excessively. You know the one—the dog left out in the yard to “play,” who instead spends the day barking at every little noise, real or perceived.

First, it is important to remember that dogs bark for a variety of reasons—warning, excitement, fear, frustration, in response to other dogs barking, etc. While we appreciate the warning bark that alerts us to intrusion, constant barking for no justifiable reason can become extremely irritating. The SPCA suggests that answering “yes” to any of the questions in the box to the right could qualify your dog as a “neighborhood noise nuisance.”

As a responsible owner, you should recognize the problem behavior and correct it. To do this, you must teach him when barking is appropriate and how much barking is acceptable. One or two barks in response to a visitor, passerby or other barking dog is not considered excessive. Prolonged, persistent barking for hours on end certainly is.

To curtail excessive barking, determine when and why your dog is barking. Is he lonely? When outside, is he confined to a small area and therefore frustrated by his lack of freedom? Is there

a lot of new activity in your area such as construction? Are there a lot of distractions or excitatory factors, such as animal traffic, human traffic, or neighboring dogs? Is he bored?

Solutions depend on the problem. For lonely dogs, expanding their territory through a fenced yard or large pen may quiet them. If possible, a companion pet might be beneficial. Make sure that all dogs have plenty of toys to play with when you are away.

To correct the problem behavior, the SPCA offers the “water training method” in which one or two squirts of water at the barking dog are used to reinforce the command “quiet.” This conditioning procedure is repeated each time the dog barks needlessly.

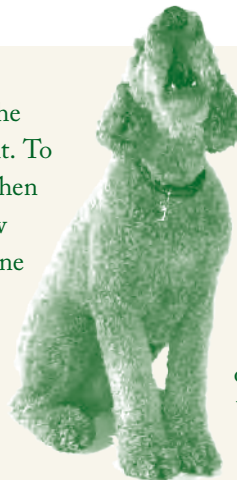
Often a day or two

of training is enough when you are consistent. It is always wise to consider a local obedience class. Such classes usually include a section on teaching a dog to stop barking on command. These professionals usually have a lot of experience with obedience problems and promote better owner-pet communication.

Please remember, praising your dog when he is appropriately quiet can be the most effective training tool, and striking an animal is both ineffective and unacceptable. We all want to be courteous neighbors and therefore must be responsible dog owners.

Does your dog bark excessively when...

- ...he is left alone and lonesome?
- ...another dog barks?
- ...kids from the neighborhood come out to play?
- ...he's outside and wants to get in?
- ...neighbors leave or return?
- ...you come home?
- ...he sees garbage collectors or passing cars?

TRASH AND RECYCLING IN EAST BRADFORD TOWNSHIP

Feel free to contact the Township (610) 436-5108 or Allied (610) 869-2222 with questions.

The following items may be co-mingled in the recycling container. We still recommend bundling paper so it does not blow around.

Newspapers, Magazines and Phone Books: No wax coated items. Bundle can be placed on top of recycling bin or along side bin.
Junk Mail and Home Office Paper: Includes envelopes, file folders, index cards and computer paper. Please note that at this time we can not accept shredded paper for recycling.
Cardboard: Cardboard must be flattened, bundled no

larger then one (1) square foot and tied with string or placed in a brown paper bag. You may include corrugated cardboard boxes; cereal, cracker, macaroni, tissue boxes, etc.; pizza boxes only if they are not greasy; please remove all inner wrappers, and flatten all boxes. Any boxes left larger then one square foot or not flattened will not be picked up. Place on top of or along side recycling bin.

Aluminum and Bi-Metal Cans: Rinse cans clean. Cans may be flattened to conserve space. Bi-metal cans include juice cans, soup cans, tuna cans, cat food cans, etc.
Plastic: #1-#7 bottles and containers only (*no motor oil or anti-freeze bottles*). On the bottom of the bottle/container you'll see a triangle made of arrows with a number in it. This is the content number for the container. No styrofoam trays, peanuts or clam shell containers.
Empty Aerosol Cans: These cans may now be recycled curbside with your other recycling.

Bulk Pick-Up: One item/set is allowed on the first pick-up of the month. This item could be a sofa, carpet, chair, table, mattress and boxspring, etc. We now recycle washers, dryers, stoves, and dishwashers. Please call the township for pick-up instructions. Refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, dehumidifiers, water coolers require you to contact Allied for pick-up arrangements, and an additional charge will be due. This is because they must have the freon removed and the item certified that the freon has been removed properly.

Cardboard: May be dropped off at the Township Building every day. Boxes must be flattened but do not need to be cut down.
Additional Bags: Stickers are available at the Township Building for additional bags, sold in sheets of 10 for \$18⁵⁰. Make check payable to **Allied Waste**. Stickers may only be used on 32-gallon bags.
Holiday Pick-Up: For holidays that fall during the week, Trash and Recycling will be picked up on Saturday. These holidays include New Years, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Trash & Recycling Vendor: Allied Waste Systems/BFI was awarded the contract for the collection of trash and recyclables from all East Bradford Township residents. The monthly fee for 2011 will be \$23.17 and is billed quarterly by Allied. The contract provides for once a week collection of three (3) 32-gallon containers or bags of household waste, recyclable items and once a month pick up of a bulk item. Blue trash totes (equal to 3 bags or cans) are available for purchase from Allied at a one-time cost of \$70.
